
Preparing for Shabbat הַבְּנָה לְשֵׁבָּת

The source:

"You shall labor for six days and do all your work, but the seventh day is a Sabbath of Adonai your God: You shall not do any work" (Exodus 20:9-10).

What you need to know:

- 1. In the Jewish mystical tradition, the Sabbath has been portrayed as a bride or queen who visits homes every week of the year. Jewish people are expected to get ready—physically and spiritually—to greet this special guest.
- 2. Polish the Shabbat candlesticks and *Kiddush* wine cup a few days before the Sabbath begins.
- 3. Clean your house before the Sabbath actually begins and prepare your Shabbat dinner. Make sure you have the following items: two *challot* to represent the double portion of manna in the desert, saving one for Shabbat lunch, kosher wine, a pretty tablecloth, and a table set with your best dinnerware. Decorating the table with fresh flowers will help to create a *Shabbesdik* ("Shabbat-like") atmosphere. Naturally the meal you serve should be a special one.
- 4. It is customary to wash oneself and put on fresh clothing for Shabbat, symbolizing readiness to welcome the Sabbath into one's home.
- 5. To add to the mood of caring and sharing, many families make it a habit to drop some coins in a *pushke* (*tzedakah* box), before lighting the Sabbath candles. When the *tzedakah* box is full, decide as a family to which organization you want to donate the money.



Things to remember:

- 1. It is a nice gesture to invite friends to your home for the Sabbath meal in keeping with the important Jewish value of *hachnasat orchim* (hospitality).
- 2. Since singing songs is an important tradition during the Sabbath meal, you may want to obtain (or even prepare yourself) a small booklet with the Shabbat songs that you sing from week to week. Be sure to have enough copies so that everyone can participate. Use English and Hebrew songs, and be creative!
- 3. Family cooperation is indispensable to the completion of all pre-Shabbat tasks. Give each member of the family something to do so that everyone can help get ready for Shabbat.
- 4. According to Jewish tradition, we get an extra soul during Shabbat.
- 5. Invite the angels to accompany you during Shabbat. (That's what Shalom Aleichem is all about.)

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How to Light the Sabbath Candles הַּדְלָקת גֵּרוֹת

The sources:

Exodus 20:8; Deuteronomy 5:12.

זַכור (שָׁמוֹר) אֶת יוֹם הַשַּׁבָּת לְקַרְשׁוֹ.

Remember (observe) the Sabbath day to keep it holy.

What you need to know:

- 1. Candles are lit at between 1 1/2 hours and 18 minutes prior to sunset (according to halacha).
- 2. Light the candles.
- 3. Draw your hands around the candles and toward your face from one to seven times (three times is most common).
- 4. Cover your eyes with your hands and say the following blessing at the same time:



The blessing for Yom Kippur is:

Praised are You, Adonai our God, Sovereign of the Universe, who makes us holy with mitzvot and instructs us to kindle the lights of (Shabbat and) the Day of Atonement.

Things to remember:

- 1. Candles are lit for the sake of shalom bayit and oneg Shabbat.
- 2. Traditionally, women light the candles, but men are encouraged to do so.
- 3. While you are required to light two candles, it is permitted to light more. Families of Eastern European heritage often light more, often one for each child. This is an interpretation of the verse "God blessed the Sabbath day." How? With light. Once you have established a pattern, continue to light that number each week.
- 4. If there are no candles available, you may say the blessing over electric or gas lights.

How to Make Shabbat Evening Kiddush קדוש לְשַׁבָּת

The source:


There are various sources, including Exodus 20:8.

What you need to know:


- 1. Raise the cup by holding it in your hand, cupped at the bottom.
- 2. Say the following:



Vayechulu hashamayim ve'ha-aretz vechol tzeva'am vayechal Elohim bayom ha-shevi'i melachto asher asah. Vayishbot bayom hashevi'i mikol melachto asher asah vayevarech Elohim et yom hashevi'i vayekadesh oto ki vo shavat mikol melachto asher bara Elohim la'asot.

Now the whole universe—sky, earth, and all their array—was completed. With the seventh day God ended the work of Creation; on the seventh day God rested with all the Divine work completed. Then God blessed the seventh day and called it holy, for with this day God had completed the work of Creation.

O God, You have chosen us and set us apart from all the peoples and in love and favor have given us the Sabbath Day in your love and favor. Praised are You Adonai for the Sabbath and its holiness.

3. Then drink the wine.

Things to remember:

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1. On Shabbat morning, sing Veshamru, then say only the modified blessing (over wine, not over the day).

- 2. Remember to drink the wine (before talking) after the blessing.
- 3. On Yom Tov, the same blessing is replaced with the following:

How to Make Havdalah הַּבְּנָלָה

The source:

Various talmudic sources, including Pesachim 103b; also Shulchan Aruch, Orach Chayim 196:1.

What you need to know:

1. Raise the wine cup and say:

Behold, God is my deliverer. I trust in You and am not afraid. For Adonai is my strength and my stronghold, the source of my deliverance. With joy we draw water from the wells of salvation. Adonai brings deliverance, blessings to the people. Selah. Adonai is a powerful God: the God of Jacob is our stronghold.

2. Next, lift the spice box and say:

Baruch atah Adonai elohaynu melech ha'olam boray minay vesamim.

Praised are You, Adonai our God, Sovereign of the Universe, who creates all kinds of spices.

Sniff the spices and pass the spice box around for everyone to sniff.

3. Now recite the blessing over the Havdalah candle:

While the blessing is recited, family members hold out their hands with palms up, cup their hands, and look at the reflection of the flame on their fingernails.

4. Finally recite the final prayer:

5. Many families conclude the service with the singing of Eliyahu ha-Navi ("Elijah the Prophet").

6. Everyone takes a sip of the wine. Then pour some of the remaining wine onto a plate (or directly over the flame) and put out the flame of the Havdalah candle. Shabbat is over, and everyone proclaims shavua tov, "a good week!" Often, people sing, shavua tov, shavua tov, shavua tov, shavua tov, shavua tov, "A good week, a week of peace. - 1. Havdalah is said about an hour after sunset on Saturday night, when three stars appear in the sky.
